An urgent case for measles vaccination in Gaza

In response to the identification of circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2 in wastewater in Gaza, followed by a single confirmed case of paralytic poliomyelitis in a young child, the first round of an oral polio vaccination campaign targeting children (aged ≤10 years) is underway and has, as of Sept 16, 2024, been highly successful.

Effects of oral sepiapterin on blood Phe concentration in a broad range of patients with phenylketonuria (APHENITY): results of an international, phase 3, randomised, double-blind, placebo-controlled trial

Phenylketonuria is an inherited condition characterised by neurotoxic accumulation of phenylalanine (Phe). APHENITY assessed the efficacy and safety of orally administered synthetic sepiapterin in children and adults with phenylketonuria.

Long-term efficacy and public health implications of the Vi-tetanus toxoid conjugate vaccine in Bangladeshi children

Typhoid fever continues to pose a substantial public health challenge in low-income and middle-income countries, including Bangladesh. WHO recommends the typhoid conjugate vaccine (TCV), which has shown an efficacy rate of 79–85% in preventing typhoid fever in endemic regions according to randomised controlled trials.

5-year vaccine protection following a single dose of Vi-tetanus toxoid conjugate vaccine in Bangladeshi children (TyVOID): a cluster randomised trial

WHO currently recommends a single dose of typhoid conjugate vaccine (TCV) in high-burden countries based on 2-year vaccine efficacy data from large randomised controlled trials. Given the decay of immunogenicity, the protection beyond 2 years is unknown. We therefore extended the follow-up of the TyVAC trial in Bangladesh to assess waning of vaccine protection to 5 years after vaccination.
